## Preventing Stormwater Runoff Pollution

Stormwater runoff in Lebanon County drains to various streams or lakes, tributaries to the Chesapeake Bay or Delaware Bay, which both contain a broad diversity of plant, animal and fish life. However decades of water pollution have threatened these plants, animals & fish. The people of Lebanon County can help keep our water clean by following these tips.

- ⇒ Only rain water should enter storm drains & inlets.
- ⇒ Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks & gutters.
- ⇒ Keep inlets and storm drains clear of leaves, grass & other debris.
- ⇒ Never dump anything into storm drains or streams.
- ⇒ Use least-toxic pesticides, follow labels and learn how to prevent pest problems.
- ⇒ Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden or rain barrel to capture runoff.
- ⇒ Compost your yard waste.
- ⇒ Pick up after your pet.
- ⇒ Wash your car on the lawn or at a car wash instead of your driveway or the street.
- ⇒ Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil.
- ⇒ Report any spills or suspicious dumping to the Township.

## General Reminders

- ① According to South Lebanon Township Ordinance #2, Section 11-G, **No operator of any vehicle shall park a vehicle on a sidewalk.** Therefore when parking in your driveway, make sure it is not blocking the sidewalk, if you have one.
- ① Reminder to **pet owners** — it is illegal to allow your pet to run at large in the Township **OR** to allow any animal to defile or desecrate on any public or private property. Keep pets on a leash or in a fenced yard. Be sure to clean up after your pet. You could be cited up to **\$600** per incident for non-compliance.
- ① A Building Permit is required to place a **storage shed** on your property. Contact the Lebanon County Planning Dept. at 228-4444 for more information.
- ① Major recreational equipment may not be parked or stored on any lot in a residential district except in a carport, an enclosed building, in a rear yard, or on a private residential driveway **NOT** within the road right-of-way. **Recreational equipment may be parked along public streets for a period of time not exceeding 24 hours, for loading and unloading purposes only.**

## Know what should go down the drain that is sewer safe

It's simple, the toilet is only meant to flush the three P's—pee, poop and paper. Human waste and toilet paper should be the only thing going down the toilet. Unfortunately, over the years, people have turned the toilet into a trash can. From medications and sanitary products to deceased pet fish and cigarette butts, if it fits, people flush it. Flushing these types of items down the toilet causes home pipes to clog, wastes water (up to 5 gallons of water every time you flush) and most importantly can have a huge impact on our sewers and not to mention our ocean. Below is a list of items that people commonly flush that should *not* be going down the toilet:

*Sanitary napkins—Paper towels—Diapers—Baby wipes—Facial tissues—Kitty litter—Condoms—Dental floss*

The only thing that should be going down the drain is what comes out of the faucet! The toilet is not the only drain that people are using to get rid of unwanted waste; people are also known to use the kitchen sink as a trash can. Since the invention of the garbage disposal, which claims to grind even the hard stuff such as small bones and fruit peels, people have turned the sink drain into a common destination for kitchen waste. Again, as long as it fits, people throw it or pour it down the drain. Letting trash flow and go down the kitchen sink (or any other drain in the house) may cause pipes to clog and can eventually lead to sewage spills that harm the environment. Here is a list of the most common things that people dump into their sinks instead of disposing of them properly:

*Fats, Oils and Grease—Food—Coffee Grounds & Eggshells—Hair—Household Hazardous Materials (motor oil, pesticides, paint solvents)*

If your lateral clogs and you have a back up due to a clog AND raw sewage pours onto the sidewalk and/or street it will be your responsibility to properly clean the area. Most important is to get the sewage discharge stopped. Call a plumber immediately as they can clear the blockage. DO NOT flush or put any additional water of any kind into your sewage disposal line. Protect the streets by putting sand to work as blocks to help slow the sewage from going to the drains. When the flow has stopped, cover all resulting wet areas with regular normal garden lime. It will help to neutralize the sewage. Owners must also know that this is the law. Willful neglect of your sewer lateral and the resulting overflow will result in the issuance of a citation.

**Sewage Spills: Property Owner Information-** A sewage spill is always a nasty surprise. Be aware of the basics and ways you might take preventative action. Be smart about what is or is not safe to flush down a toilet or drain.

Each property owner is responsible for maintaining the sewer line (lateral) from the property to the connection with the Township's sewer main. The lateral will often continue off the property out to the sewer main, which is generally near the middle of the street.

**For spills outside your home—** Contact your utility or a registered septic tank contractor for clean up.— All collected sewage must be disposed of in a DEP approved site.— Minor spills requiring immediate attention may be disinfected with regular garden lime from a garden shop. Follow the lime container's label instructions for personal protective equipment needed.— Sprinkle the lime onto the spill so the spill is dusted mostly white on the surface. If the residue is thicker in some places use a rake to mix the lime and the residue.— After a day, rake up the thicker residue and place it in a trash bag for disposal with the other trash. Use a sprinkler or hose to water the lime and residue into the soil.

Let the area dry in the sun a day before allowing access. If there is still white lime dust visible on the yard, water it in until the white dust is gone.

So, let's keep our wastewater flowing and our oceans clean. Educate yourself and others. **Know What 2 Flush** and what to put down the drain. Protect our storm sewers and environment!

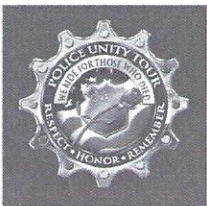
## Police Unity Tour

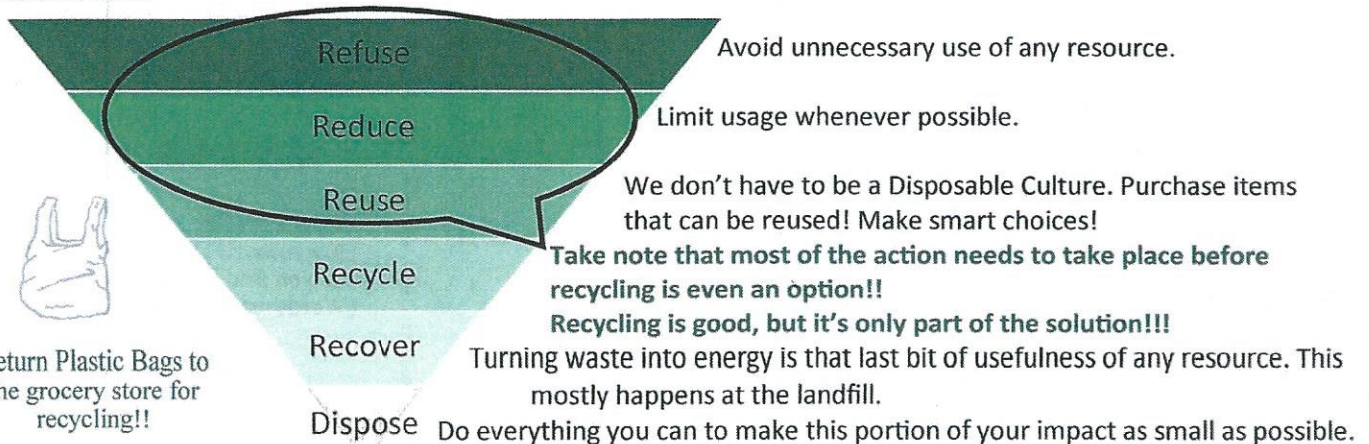

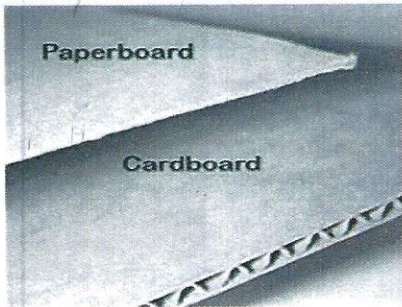

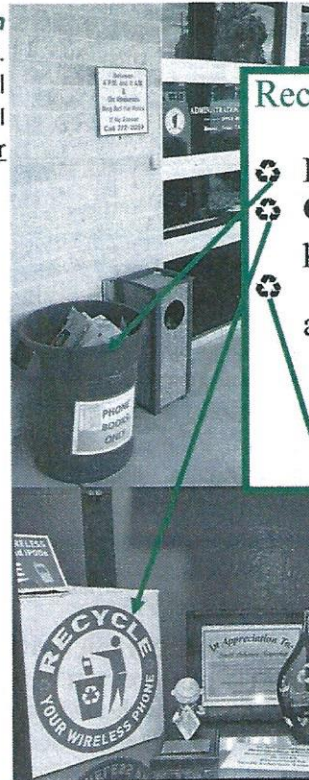

# Grass Clippings

When you are mowing your lawn, please keep in mind it is illegal to allow grass clippings to remain on the street. Section 901 of the South Lebanon Township Stormwater Management Ordinance states "No person shall allow or cause to allow, discharges into the MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) or discharges into waters of the Commonwealth, which are not **composed entirely of storm water**."



Q: What if my property is not near a storm drain?

A: Wind, rain and traffic will take your grass clippings further than you realize!

Q: Clippings from my small yard won't make that much of an impact on the water supply, will they?

A: If each of the 12.79 million residents of PA allowed **1 blade of grass** into the storm sewer, that's like dumping ALL the grass from the end zone to the 15 yard line on a standard football field into the Chesapeake Bay, along with chemical treatments and animal waste that were on the grass. YUCK!

## Stormwater & MS4

### What is MS4?

Untreated or uncontrolled storm water runoff is the number one cause of impairment in our local waterways. Polluted runoff is often transported through municipal drainage systems until it eventually discharges into streams, lakes, and rivers untreated.

An MS4, or **Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System**, is comprised of drainage systems, including streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels and storm pipes, owned by a state, county, city, town, township, borough or other public entity.

The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) storm water Phase II regulations require permit coverage for storm water discharges from MS4s, mainly those located in urbanized areas.

Therefore, most Townships and Boroughs are required to comply with the MS4 Program.

S Leb Twp Branch/Yard Waste Collection will continue until all streets in the Township have been visited. Each street will only be visited ONCE! ## **Grass Clippings - Please read!**

### **GRASS CLIPPINGS**

When you are mowing your lawn, please keep in mind it is illegal to blow the clippings into the street. If you do, you are required to remove them from the street when finished. Section 901 of the South Lebanon Township Stormwater Management Ordinance states "No person shall allow or cause to allow, discharges into the MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) or discharges into waters of the Commonwealth, which are not composed entirely of storm water.

Grass clippings left in the street get washed away by storm water and deposited in the water system. This causes storm drains to clog and back up causing flooding. The grass also releases nitrogen into the water system which is not good for the water.

## What is Storm Water?

Storm water is water from precipitation that flows across the ground and pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt. The water seeps into the ground or drains into what we call storm sewers. These are the drains you see at street corners or at low points on the sides of streets. Collectively, the draining water is called storm water runoff.

## Why is Storm Water "Good Rain Gone Wrong"?

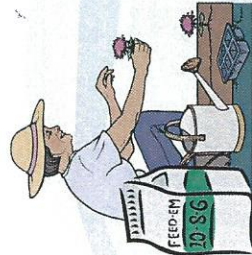
Storm water becomes a problem when it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants as it flows or when it causes flooding and erosion of stream banks. Storm water travels through a system of pipes and roadside ditches that make up storm sewer systems. It eventually flows directly to a lake, river, stream, wetland, or coastal water. All of the pollutants storm water carries along the way empty into our waters, too, because storm water does not get treated!



Pet wastes left on the ground get carried away by storm water, contributing harmful bacteria, parasites and viruses to our water.



Vehicles drip fluids (oil, grease, gasoline, antifreeze, brake fluids, etc.) onto paved areas where storm water runoff carries them through our storm drains and into our water.



Chemicals used to grow and maintain beautiful lawns and gardens, if not used properly, can run off into the storm drains when it rains or when we water our lawns and gardens.



Waste from chemicals and materials used in construction can wash into the storm sewer system when it rains. Soil that erodes from construction sites causes environmental degradation, including harming fish and shellfish populations that are important for recreation and our economy.

## Where To Go To Continue the Information Flow

Your community is preventing storm water pollution through a storm water management program. This program addresses storm water pollution from construction, new development, illegal dumping to the storm sewer system, and pollution prevention and good housekeeping practices in municipal operations. It will also continue to educate the community and get everyone involved in making sure the only thing that storm water contributes to our water is ... water! Contact your community's storm water management program coordinator or the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection for more information about storm water management.

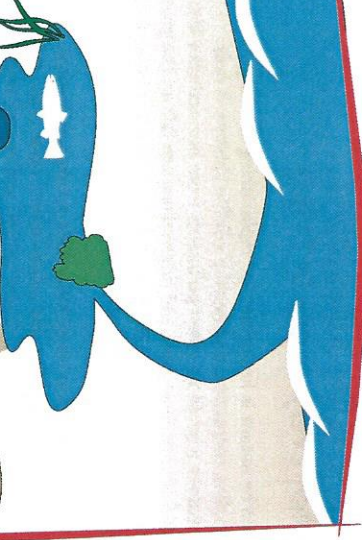
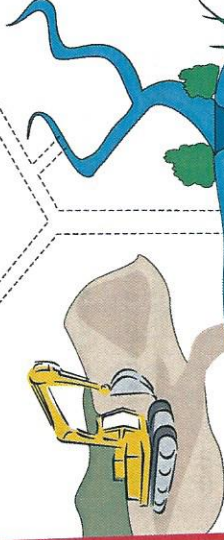

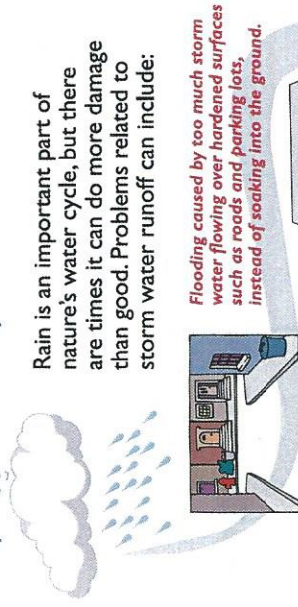
Understanding Storm Water and How It Can Affect Your Money, Safety, Health, and the Environment



## Answers to Test Your Storm Sewer System Savvy:

- 1. Ditch** – Part of the storm sewer system. Most people think that the system is just a series of underground pipes. It can also include ditches used to convey storm water from the land to a receiving lake, river, or stream.
- 2. Fire Hydrant** – Not part of the storm sewer system. Water sprayed from fire hydrants is not storm water, but is allowed by law to enter the storm sewer system.
- 3. Curb with Storm Drain Inlet** – Part of the storm sewer system. Many people do not realize that this is an opening leading to the storm sewer system. Anything going into this inlet (e.g., trash, leaves, improperly disposed of hazardous materials) travel directly to a receiving lake, river, or stream without being treated first. Many communities send storm drains with "Do Not Dump" messages to let people know.
- 4. Storm Sewer Outfall** – Part of the storm sewer system. An outfall is where storm water drains from the storm sewer system into a receiving lake, stream, or river. If there is a flow from an outfall when it isn't raining, there could be a problem with the system or someone has used a storm drain for illegally disposing of materials.
- 5. Toilet** – Not part of the storm sewer system. Wastewater from sinks and toilets in houses and businesses travel through a sewer system constructed to carry sanitary wastes. In some instances, older communities may have a combined sewer system designed to carry both storm water and sanitary waste.
- 6. Septic System** – Not part of the storm sewer system. Homeowners use septic tanks to manage sanitary wastes on-site. Improperly maintained septic systems can leak and contribute pollutants to the storm sewer system, as well as directly to lakes, rivers, and streams.
- 7. Roads and Other Paved Areas** – Not part of the storm sewer system. Roads and other hardened surfaces such as parking lots and sidewalks can accumulate pollutants (e.g., oil, grease, dirt, leaves, trash, pet wastes) that storm water eventually washes into the storm sewer system.
- 8. Storm Drain Inlet** – Part of the storm sewer system. This is another example of what a storm drain may look like. Like the storm drain inlet shown in picture #3, anything that enters this drain will go directly to streams, rivers, and lakes without being treated first. It is important to recognize this as a storm drain to prevent it from being used as a trash can.

## What Happens When It Rains?



Rain is an important part of nature's water cycle, but there are times it can do more damage than good. Problems related to storm water runoff can include:

Flooding caused by too much storm water flowing over hardened surfaces such as roads and parking lots, instead of soaking into the ground.

Increases in spending on maintaining storm drains that the storm sewer system that become clogged with excessive amounts of dirt and debris.



Decreases in sportfish populations because storm water carries sediment and pollutants that degrade important fish habitat.

More expensive treatment technologies to remove harmful pollutants carried by storm water into our drinking water supplies.



Closed beaches due to high levels of bacteria carried by storm water that make swimming unsafe.

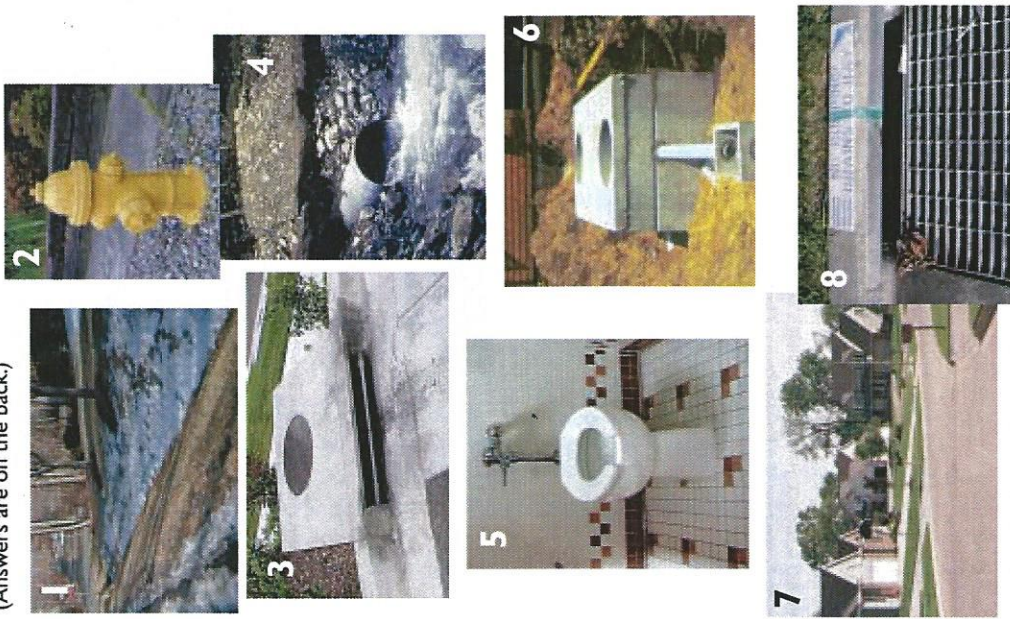

## Restoring Rain's Reputation: What Everyone Can Do To Help

Rain by nature is important for replenishing drinking water supplies, recreation, and healthy wildlife habitats. It only becomes a problem when pollutants from our activities like car maintenance, lawn care, and dog walking are left on the ground for rain to wash away. Here are some of the most important ways to prevent storm water pollution:

- Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint—never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone who does.
- Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff.
- Look for signs of soil and other pollutants, such as debris and chemicals, leaving construction sites in storm water runoff or tracked into roads by construction vehicles. Report poorly managed construction sites that could impact storm water runoff to your community. (See the back of this brochure for contact information.)
- Install innovative storm water practices on residential property, such as rain barrels or rain gardens, that capture storm water and keep it on site instead of letting it drain away into the storm sewer system.
- Report any discharges from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather—a sign that there could be a problem with the storm sewer system.
- Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess—in a backyard or at the park—storm water runoff can carry pet waste from the land to the storm sewer system to a stream.
- Store materials that could pollute storm water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage that do not rust or leak to eliminate exposure of materials to storm water.

## What Can You Do ?

.....

By Practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of stormwater systems. Adopt these healthy household habits and help protect lakes, streams, rivers, wetlands, and coastal waters. Don't forget to report a suspected Illicit Discharges to your local municipality office.

- ◆ Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams
- ◆ Use fertilizers sparingly, sweep up driveways, sidewalks and gutters.
- ◆ Use least toxic pesticides
- ◆ Dispose of household hazardous waste, paints, used auto fluids and batteries at designated collection or recycling locations
- ◆ Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway
- ◆ Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil
- ◆ Pick up after your pet
- ◆ Pick up trash in your area and dispose of properly so it doesn't enter a storm drain
- ◆ Contact the South Lebanon Township Office 717-274-0481, to report a suspected illicit discharge.

## What is an Illicit Discharge?



An illicit discharge is "any discharge to an MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) that is not composed entirely of stormwater..." Illicit discharges are considered "illicit" because MS4s are not designed to accept, process, or discharge such non-stormwater wastes.

In certain locations MS4s are directly connected to a waterbody and do not receive any type of treatment before being discharged to the receiving water bodies. Since this water is untreated, it is vital that only stormwater be discharged from MS4s.

There are a few exceptions. To learn what they are, contact your local municipality or Conservation District.

Paints, septic system discharges, grey-water (i.e. washing machines), grease, waste oil, etc., are examples of illicit discharges.

Under the federal NPDES Phase I and II regulations and many State Nutrient Management Strategies, **every community** must have a program to:

1. identify, address, and prevent illicit discharges;
2. identify the location of all storm sewer system outfalls;
3. create ordinances that prohibit illicit discharges into the storm sewer system and implement enforcement procedures;
4. educate public employees, businesses and the general public to hazards associated with illicit discharges.

Sources of illicit discharges may include:

- Sanitary wastewater
- Effluent from septic tanks
- Car wash wastewater (water from individual residential car washing is okay)
- Improper oil disposal
- Pet Waste
- Radiator flushing disposal
- Laundry wastewaters
- Pesticides & Fertilizers
- Spills from roadway accidents
- Improper disposal of auto and household toxic fluid

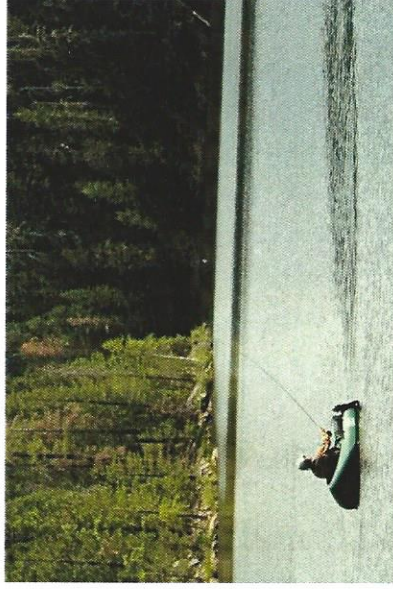


## Why Should You Care?



Illicit discharge into stormwater systems produce negative impacts by carrying pollutants to surface waters, the same surface waters we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

Illicit Discharges along with polluted stormwater runoff are the greatest threat to clean water.



# Be the Solution... to Storm Drain Pollution

"The Lebanon County Clean Water Alliance is a coalition of government agencies and interested stakeholders providing leadership in the conservation, protection and enhancement of water resources for the people of Lebanon County."

The Lebanon County Clean Water Alliance was formed in an effort to address U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection requirements focused on improving the quality of our streams, rivers, lakes and bays.

Runoff in Lebanon County drains to various streams or lakes. Lebanon County's streams are tributaries to the Chesapeake Bay or Delaware Bay, which both contain a broad diversity of plant, animal and fish life. However, decades of water pollution have threatened these plants, animals and fish. Approximately 19% of all stream and river miles in Pennsylvania are considered impaired because they fail to attain designated water quality standards. Fortunately, the people of Lebanon County can help keep our water clean. See reverse side for tips on how you can help!

## **TIPS FOR PREVENTING STORMWATER RUNOFF POLLUTION**

- **Only water should enter storm drains and inlets.**
- **Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks, and gutters.**
- **Keep inlets and storm drains clear of leaves, grass and other debris.**
- **Never dump anything into storm drains or streams.**
- **Pick up after your pet.**
- **Compost your yard waste or leave for your local municipality to collect and compost.**
- **Use least-toxic pesticides, follow labels, and learn how to prevent pest problems.**
- **Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden or rain barrel to capture runoff.**
- **Wash your car on the lawn or at a car wash instead of your driveway or the street.**
- **Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil.**
- **Report any spills or suspicious dumping to your local municipality.**

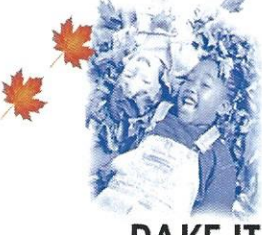

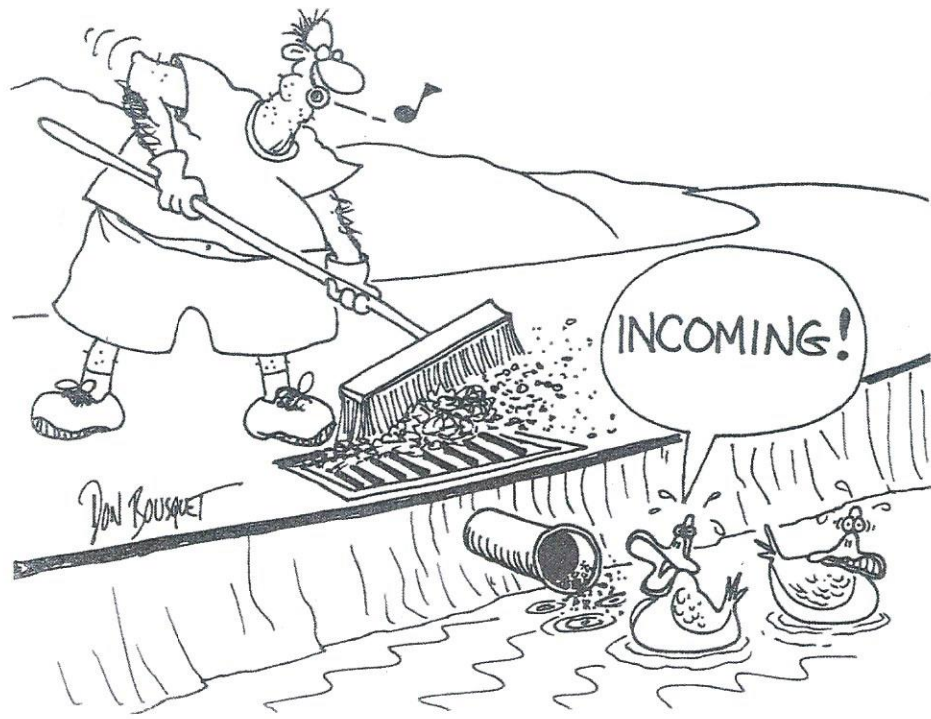

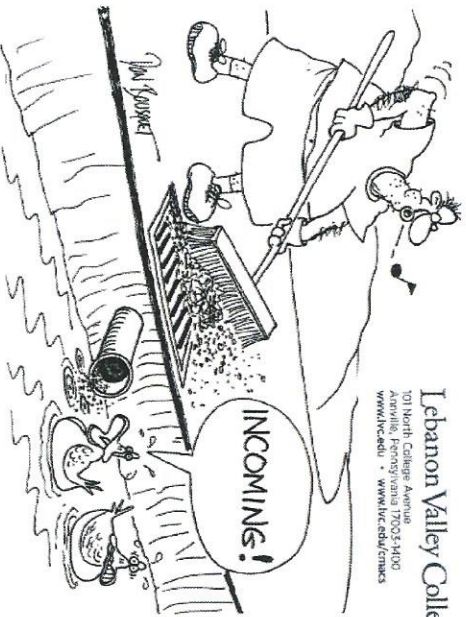

## State funds help get environmental effort off the ground

ANNVILLE — It's never too early to start working on improving the environment. Officials at Lebanon Valley College are just hoping it's not too late.

This past June, the college started an environmental sustainability center — Center for Municipal and Corporate Sustainability — with Karen Feather as the director.

Sustainability refers to practices that contribute to the quality of the environment on a long-term basis. The goal of the sustainability center is to raise awareness of ecological issues while working to find solutions.

Funds from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development helped to get the center off

the ground.

Now, due to Feather's efforts, the sustainability center has obtained a grant for nearly \$50,000 from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation that will be used to identify and reduce water pollution in the county.

Added to those funds will be a contribution of \$4,450 from the Center for Watershed Protection Inc.

"My mission with the center is twofold," Feather said. "To support the center advisory committee and to work on academic curriculum, and then, off-campus, to find resources to help the local community."

One of the first projects of the center was to survey municipalities throughout Lebanon County to find out what help they needed with environmental issues.

"Overwhelmingly, the answer was

MS4," Feather said.

MS4 stands for municipal separate storm sewer system and also refers to the guidelines and regulations that municipalities have to adhere to regarding storm water management plans. The goal is to control polluted water runoff.

When she started looking into MS4,

Feather realized she didn't have enough information to get the funding she needed to help the municipalities. Grant money was a necessity.

Feather did some detective work and discovered an agency that could help the center get the funds it needed to help the county.

That would be the Center for Watershed Protection, based in Maryland, which had assisted a number of Pennsylvania communities in funding projects.

In York County, it brought together communities to address MS4 issues, and after formulating a plan, they were able to get a grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Feather contacted the group, and with its help, received the Fish and Wildlife grant for Lebanon County.

The grant to enable municipalities to comply with MS4 regulations, such as stream restoration along the Quittapahilla Creek.

"We want to come up with a plan to reduce the amount of pollution that enters our waterways through storm water," Feather said. "Part of the funding will be used to develop courses related to sustainability issues."

Later this month, members of the water-

shed protection group will come to Lebanon County and expect to be working in the area until September.

"They're going to determine what level of pollution is entering our waterways and they'll help to identify and prioritize what projects we can do to reduce pollution," Feather said. "By fall, we may be eligible for another year's funding."

Meanwhile, Feather will keep grant hunting because no matter how good intentions are, without the funding to back projects, little can be done.

"Climate change is the biggest thing. Everybody in the world is going to have to adapt and be resilient," Feather said. "Just raising awareness is a big job. The sense is that we have a big problem and we need to fix it. To say 'climate warming' sounds ok - being warm is nice - but it's really climate disruption."

In 2008, a task force had been assembled by the college to study sustainability, and to work toward reducing the carbon footprint generated by

the college and its people.

The sustainability center is one outcome of that task force.

With the administration focused on living more mindfully with the environment, the college now uses electric power almost solely generated by wind, and courses related to protecting the environment have been added to the curriculum.

The LVC faculty had been asked by the administration to either create courses that address sustainability or to integrate that concept into already existing courses, Feather said.

Back in 2011, 18 municipalities in Lebanon County joined together to form the Lebanon County Clean Water Alliance. The group was started by Chris Troup, who was, at the time, the head of the Lebanon County Planning Department.

"They met to share ideas and raise awareness, like don't put grass clippings down storm water drains," Feather said.

Now, after the watershed group prepares a plan for the county, it will be up to municipalities to

implement the plan and the Clean Water Alliance will be at the helm.

Last semester, the sustainability center started five college students as interns to work on environmental projects throughout the county, mostly addressing MS4 requirements. They focused on the City of Lebanon, and Annville, North Cornwall, West Lebanon and South Londonderry townships.

Sophomore Kelly Jacobs, from Dallas, Pa., is the president of LVC's Environmental Club. As an intern, Jacobs was attached to the City of Lebanon, with Robin Getz, director of public works, as her supervisor.

"I got to do a couple of different jobs," Jacobs said. "Lebanon has about 1,200 catch basins, and I went out to about 300 of them to make sure they were in good working condition."

In the office, Jacob helped to work on the city's annual MS4 report, adding changes required by the Department of Environmental Resources.

After graduation, Jacobs said she would like to pursue a career in environmental economics, and the internship gave her some insight in that direction.

"I learned a lot about local government," Jacobs said.

# MS4 PUBLIC PRESENTATION

## ILLICIT DISCHARGE DETECTION AND REPORTING

South Lebanon Township  
October 13, 2015

## What does the MS4 permit require?

- 1) Public education and outreach on stormwater impacts.
- 2) Public participation/involvement.
- 3) Illicit discharge detection and elimination.
- 4) Construction site stormwater runoff control.
- 5) Post-construction stormwater management in new development/redevelopment.
- 6) Pollution prevention/good housekeeping for municipal operations and maintenance activities.

## Illicit Discharge Detection

No person shall allow, or cause to allow, discharges into the regulated Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) which are not composed entirely of storm water.”

There are a few exceptions, which will be covered later.

These discharges are prohibited by South Lebanon Township's Stormwater Management Ordinance, NO. 332.

## Why the concern over illicit discharges?

Anything that enters a storm sewer is discharged **UNTREATED** into the streams, rivers and lakes we use for swimming, fishing and providing drinking water.

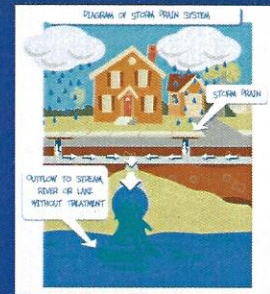

## Illicit Discharges Include:

- Sanitary wastewater
- Effluent from septic tanks
- Grass clippings and other yard waste
- Pet waste
- Pesticides and fertilizers
- Laundry wastewater
- Roof drains and sump pumps-must discharge to pervious areas.



## Illicit Discharges Include:

- Improper disposal of auto and household toxic fluids, including:
  - Motor oil
  - Paint
  - Cleaning chemicals
  - Antifreeze
- Waste from construction activities



## Illicit Discharges Include:

- Spills from roadway accidents
- Wastewater from commercial car washes
- Improperly stored materials, including dry chemicals, sand, mulch, etc.



## Exceptions (Authorized Discharges)

The following discharges are authorized UNLESS they are determined to be significant contributors to pollution to the regulated small MS4 or to waters of the Commonwealth.

- Firefighting activities
- Potable water sources
- Irrigation drainage
- Air conditioning condensate
- Lawn watering
- Dechlorinated swimming pool discharges
- Individual residential car washing

## Exceptions (Authorized Discharges)

- Natural flows: springs, wetlands, diverted streams
- Uncontaminated groundwater from the following sources: crawl space pumps, sump pumps, foundations, footing drains
- Pavement wash water: no spills or leaks must have occurred, and no detergents can be used
- External building washdown which does not use detergents or other compounds

## Documenting Illicit Discharges

- Take pictures of any illicit discharges discovered.
- Note the location and address of the discharge, material being discharged, time of discovery, etc. – use the Illicit Discharge Reporting Form.

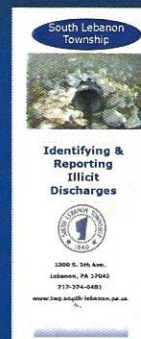
## Documenting Illicit Discharges

- Report the discharge to the Township, who should then contact the Township Engineer.
- All illicit discharges may be reported to DEP, and it is the responsibility of either the discharger or the property owner to do so. See the “Reporting Requirements” document provided.
- Contact DEP immediately if emergency response and/or assistance with cleanup is needed.

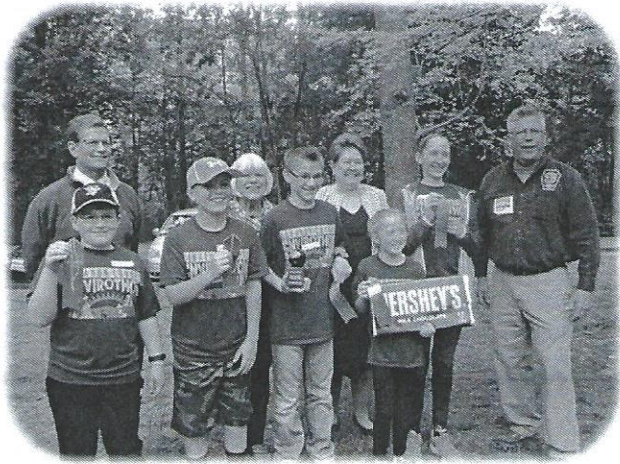

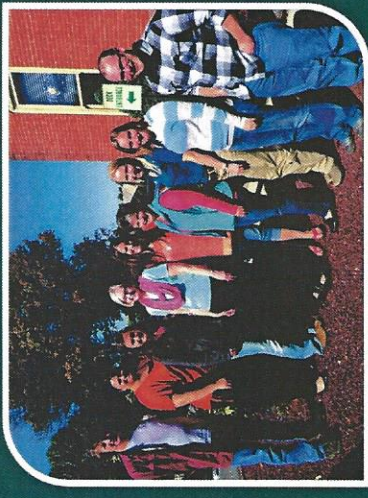
